Rocha EcoChurch

In order to help us express our care for God's World, our three churches have joined the <u>Rocha Ecochurch Scheme</u>. The EcoChurch vision is for churches of all denominations to care for creation as an integral part of loving their neighbours and following God faithfully.

The Diocese of Southwark has set an aim to be an EcoChurch diocese.

The first step on signing up is to complete a local survey on five key areas of church life, to help us establish a baseline, determine our priorities and make plans for progress to Go Green. The five areas are

- Worship and teaching
- Management of church buildings
- Management of church land
- Community and global engagement
- Lifestyle



There are a series of awards depending on a church's performance in these key areas and all three churches in Richmond Team Ministry have already received the Bronze Award. The certificates are proudly displayed, however, we will continue our commitment to Caring for God's earth and we are already working towards the next level. Some of our projects are simple such as signs to ensure all lights are switched off, some are more extensive such as a car share scheme, some involve our finances such as supporting environmental work and some will be large capital projects for when we renovate our churches and other buildings.

Car Share – can you help?

What is Car Sharing?

Car sharing, also known as lift sharing, car-pooling or ride sharing is the coordinated matching up of lifts between drivers and passengers who share a common or similar route. It has the potential to significantly reduce emissions from travel, particularly if used by large numbers of people making repeat journeys with others to a common destination.

Many of us travel to church on foot, or bike or on the bus or tube but maybe there are options for sharing cars to reduce the number of Sunday trips we make as a congregation. We are looking for someone from each church to consider volunteering to set this up. It would be a very simple model – asking for those who drive to identify themselves and then to try and 'matchmake' to encourage sharing of lifts with those living in their neighbourhood. Tips for a Green Christmas

Let's tackle the big one first – GIFTS, gifts and more gifts. What about sustainable giving? Giving services rather than gifts – offers of dog walking, babysitting, car cleaning, IT support (certainly on my Christmas list. Ed). Experiences to savour – theatre trip, afternoon tea or spa session. Edible treats especially home made treats or home grown flowers and veggies. Avoid anything with batteries as they result in toxic waste or at least use rechargeable ones – did you know 30% of battery sales occur at Christmas time. (Data from European Recycling Platform).

What about reducing the number we buy – simplify the 'Gift go round'. Limit the number of presents (and value) perhaps a challenge of one gift per person or go further and every member of the family just buy for one other – pick names out of a hat to make sure it is fair.

Gift wrapping is another area where we can go green. Avoid metallic wrapping paper as this cannot be recycled. Also, we can choose Christmas cards that don't have embellishments, meaning they are easier to recycle too. Recycle those gift bags, make fabric bags from old clothes and decorate with foraged finishing touches – holly springs, fir cones even dry some slices of orange. Avoid the sticky tape and use reusable ribbon or string instead.
