Dear Friends,

As I grow a little older the radio is becoming far more appealing than the TV, and with apps which allow me to listen to programmes at times which suit and in places where the company of other voices is appreciated and I can use my imagination to enliven a walk or a car journey, I love the flexibility. This week I have been especially moved by the conversation between the Dimbleby brothers, Nick and Jonathan, who have been sensitively sharing their journey through the dark days of Nick's recent Motor Neurone Disease diagnosis (The Bright Side of Life, Radio 4). I admit to shedding a few tears as I listened to their heartbreaking account of living with this incurable and fatal disease, and to being deeply affected by the honesty and rawness of the pain expressed. For Nick there is little comfort as the disease slowly robs him of all his faculties, including his artistic ability to express life through sculpting and creating beautiful things. But he is surrounded by a loving and supportive family, and he finds much solace in his home, his garden and his attention demanding kitten. During his conversation with his brother, belief in life after death wasn't really touched upon, but the reality of Nick's situation and the unbearable truth of the disease's progress, prompted questions about end of life decisions which no one ever wants to have to contemplate. I found the programme profoundly moving just for its sheer honesty and refusal to avoid asking the painful questions, for which there is often no easy answer.

The other radio programme which has given me plenty of pause for thought this week has been The Archers, that longest running Radio 4 saga set in the fictional farming community of Ambridge. The stories weave around the everyday exploits and dramas of local people struggling with life's dilemmas, traumas and difficulties. And this last week has been more dramatic than usual with the ending of the dastardly Rob Titchener's life, a character who has caused so much pain and trauma to others – The Archers has never been afraid to grasp the nettle and in a story line centred around domestic abuse it has shone a light on the devastation and damaged which is so often hidden away from view and therefore away from any hope of finding help and support. Last night's episode was especially enlightening, and full of hope as an unexpected and sensitive conversation took place between two people suddenly finding that they had a shared understanding of the deep psychological pain suffered at the hands of another. There is finally a glimmer of light at the end of a long dark tunnel for Rob's wife Helen, along with the very real hope of healing and peace and a brighter, more joy-filled future. Fiction it may be, but the emotional roller-coaster of life in Ambridge holds up a mirror to the world and our own seen and unseen lives. And that's before we explore the Vicar's current story line!

Of course it's not only radio where life's mysteries are explored through story and conversation. This Saturday Dr Who returns to our TV screens, and I can't wait, especially as Russell T Davies is back in the story-writing driving seat, and David Tenant returns as the man himself. I'm old enough to remember William Hartnell who played the first Dr Who, and of sitting on the sofa with my Gran on Saturday evenings, both of us hiding behind a cushion as the terrifying daleks took their revenge and exterminated everything in sight. Of course, the reason I love Dr Who so much is that it's the story of redemption. Sylvester McCoy who played the Dr between 1987-89, put it very nicely when he was asked recently why the show is so beloved and has lasted for 60 years: "this is the story of someone coming down to earth, who takes on human form, and tries to do good and help out. And it's kind of a lonely figure, full of love for humanity." I think the reason why Dr Who is so loved and has lasted so long is that we recognise in the central figure something of our Saviour Jesus Christ, and the deep truth of the Divine life hidden within ours, a mystery which touches our hearts and makes them beat a little faster. We long for love and kindness and hope and redemption to come down and bring healing to our lives and to those we love who are suffering. We long to believe that we are not alone, that there is a power higher than our own power, which can lift us up out of the sorry stories the world tells, and shows us that human beings can be better, that we can do better, and that we can survive and overcome even the most fearful situations when love is at the helm. The stories are full of hope, of redemption, of finding that true power comes from humility and love, of knowing that the One who comes from above comes with deep healing in his wings, and that the past, present and future is held firmly in His hands. The great Dr's companions learn to trust his rather mysterious ways, and despite their frequent mistakes and ability to let him down, they are empowered through their love for him to be the best they can be, and eventually they take on his mantle and share his burden and learn from him. And their lives are changed for ever. Sounds familiar!

This weekend as we celebrate the feast of Christ the King, I pray that we will experience the healing, redemptive love of God and that the world will come under his just and gentle rule and become a place where stories of hope and healing are shared, and joy is found, even in the darkest and scariest of places.
