Dear Friends,

This week, I have had the joy of attending an academic conference: The Society for the Study of Theology conference. Its theme this year has been Flesh and Blood Theologies: thinking about embodiment in relation to God.

It has been a very interesting few days, stretching my thinking in all manner of new directions.

By dint of not reading the abstracts of all the papers available to go and listen to, I accidentally attended several sessions which we completely unexpected: theology reflected in works of high fashion; the theology of experiential theatre, where distinctions between 'performer' and 'observer' become blurred; the voice as bodily (rather than thinking about speech as disembodied words).

And I have thought and heard a great deal about Christ's Body: born of Mary, dwelling among us, dying on the cross, still wounded in the resurrection, broken each Eucharist, composed of us. We've heard and talked about death and life; race and nationhood; skin and flesh; gender and blood.

Last night, several of us were reflecting on the papers which we enjoyed most, and what has been our favourite aspect of the three days. An extraverted friend declared that more than any of the papers, it's been the people and the experience of doing theology together in questions and conversations which he has most enjoyed.

It is a bit only a joy to do theology (God-talk) together, it is essential to do so. Theology is the work of community and creativity. Testing, together, our experience of who God is and who God is calling us to be. And our theological community, The Church, spans geographical and temporal boundaries. Early Church Fathers (from the first 4 centuries after the Ascension) still contribute to the conversation. And fresh thoughts and experiences are taken seriously and contribute to our joint understanding.

Just like we do at church: in chatting about the sermon over coffee, discussing the sermon, asking for someone's prayers, reflecting on the vacancy and discernment, describing to friends a situation or encounter.

We just find less use for words like 'ontological,' 'apophatic' and 'hermeneutic' in the theology we

Particularly, we do this work in Holy Week, often in silence, in action, and in music. Holy Week offers us the opportunity to do experiential, embodied theology together: to cheer Christ's arrival or to call for his blood, to have our feet washed, to wait in the garden, to watch in horror from the foot of the cross, to celebrate resurrected and eternal life.

It is my strong encouragement to you to join us for Holy Week, not just to move from Triumphal Entry on Palm Sunday to Triumphant Resurrection on Easter Day, but to make that journey together and with Christ along the road that leads to death and through death. To ask, again, what it means.

The Vacancy: Seeking a new Team Rector and Vicar of St Mary Magdalene

We have been reflecting on and praying for this vacancy, and about the qualities which we would like from a new Team Rector and Vicar of SMM for 4 months, and it is time for us to begin to collate all the thoughts and feedback. We are beginning the process of bringing together common themes, concerns and ideas for how we might best address the issues raised and take matters forward.

To that end, each church will want to convene a congregational meeting as soon as possible to discuss any matters which have not yet been voiced, about RTM and what we are looking for in a new Rector and Vicar: concerns, hopes, reflections, experiences, and joys! Conveners from each of the churches are organising these now. SMM will hold its congregational meeting after its 9:30am service on 6 April, and members of all the congregations at SMM are invited to come. SJD and SMT, notices will be given in church as soon as appropriate dates and times are agreed. Following that, all three churches will meet together again, with a view to beginning work on a Parish Profile which reflects our wonderful Team Ministry, each of our churches, and the whole community in Richmond.

Parish Office on the move

The parish office will be functioning as normal through to Easter and the week after Easter, but we have also started the first phase of the move to St Matthias Church.

Electoral Roll Revision

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting and the three Annual Church Meetings will be held on 18 May this year and it is then that the church officers will be elected. Church officers are the Wardens, Deanery Synod Representatives, PCC lay members and Church Committee lay members.

As with national elections, we have to have an electoral roll for this. As our existing roll is now 6 years old it is no longer valid, has to go into the bin and we have to create a new one. This means everyone who would like to vote has to enrol; your name will not be brought forward from the old roll.

Creation of the new roll will start this Sunday 30 March. To enrol you need to complete an application form which will be available at the back of each church. The completed form should be left in the collection post box provided for these. Enrolment will continue up to and including Sunday 27 April.

Lent Book Recommendations

'Why Church? Christianity as it was meant to be' by Scott Cowdell Church Publishing Inc £14.99 (978-1-64065-736-6)

This is a refreshing and positive book for those of us who like to learn from history - and from the Christian faith globally - as we ponder the Church in our own times. Cowdell passionately argues that the Church is essential to Christianity: Christ is the Vine and we are the branches. It is thoughtful, positive and encourages church in church buildings with the Eucharist at the centre. It is encouraging in approach and is good for Lent study with questions after every chapter.

'Healing Wounds: the 2025 Lent Book' by Erik Varden Bloomsbury £12.99 (978-1-3994-1040-3)

Eric Varden is a Cistercian Monk and the book is based on a 13th Century poem by a fellow Cistercian monk who focussed on Christ's wounds (the hymn 'O Sacred Head, sore wounded' is thought to be derived from this poem). It is deep, unflinching in its description of Christ's wounds and invites us to consider our own woundedness, with a final chapter on Flourishing. Eric Varden prayerfully unwraps all of this, encouraging us to see that by Christ's wounds we are healed.

Church Services:

St John the Divine's Sunday service at 11.00am is both in-person and live-streamed via their Facebook page. St John's midweek service takes place on Tuesday evenings with half an hour of quiet contemplation focused on the Blessed Sacrament at 6.30pm, followed by the Said Eucharist at 7.00pm. The last Tuesday of the month our regular Said Eucharist at 7pm is a Eucharist for Healing and Wholeness, with the opportunity to receive the Ministry of Laying on of Hands with Prayer and Anointing for yourself or to receive it on someone else's behalf. All are welcome.

St Mary Magdalene's Sunday services are at 8.00am, 9.30am, 11.30am (third Sunday only) and 6.30pm. There is a Said Eucharist at 10.00am every Wednesday, followed by coffee.

St Matthias' 9.30am Sunday service is an in-person service. The midweek Eucharist at St Matthias is held on Thursdays at 10.00am and is followed by coffee and biscuits. Everyone is very welcome to join us.
