Dear Friends,

The 19th July marked two years since I began my ministry as Team Vicar in the Richmond Team Ministry, with special responsibility for St John's. Two years is long enough for roots to begin to deepen - for life to become not just familiar but inhabited. And as I've walked this landscape - spiritually and literally - I've found myself drawn to the quiet wisdom of ...trees!

Here in Richmond, we are surrounded by them. The ancient oaks of Richmond Park. The diverse, curated beauty of Kew Gardens. Each tree with its own form, rhythm, and life - and yet, beneath the surface, something even more remarkable: an underground network of roots and fungal threads known as the *wood wide web*. Trees, it turns out, do not live in isolation. They communicate, care, and share. They warn one another of danger. They pass nutrients to those in distress. Older trees - "mother trees" - often surrender their own energy to help new life flourish.

It is, to me, a living parable of the Church.

We are not solitary believers. We are part of a living, growing communion - rooted in Christ, bound to one another in grace. And here in Richmond, we have our own spiritual root system, invisible perhaps, but very much alive. I like to imagine the hidden roots that connect St Matthias, St Mary Magdalene and St John the Divine. Each has its own distinct life and voice. Each has its own strengths and struggles. But beneath the surface, we are one: held by a shared history, nourished by the same Gospel, and shaped by our shared calling to follow Christ. I have a deep love for each of our churches for this reason.

That root system stretches beyond our own Team. It intertwines with the other Christian communities of Richmond - Anglican, Roman Catholic, Methodist, Baptist, Orthodox, Charismatic, Evangelical. We may grow in different shapes, but we are nourished by the same Spirit. We belong not just to our building or tradition, but to the one Body of Christ.

The image of the forest brings to mind something else, too - something we often long for in church life: the beauty of a strong family system. Healthy families, like healthy forests, are grounded in a few simple but vital things: shared purpose, clear boundaries, open communication, and the freedom to be both held and changed by love. Strong families give space for growth and failure. They honour each member's individuality, while staying connected in times of stress or disagreement. Above all, they prioritise presence - showing up, again and again, with grace and honesty. This is what the Church at its best can be: a family of many roots, many branches, nourished by the same living water, and committed to walking together - even when it's easier to drift apart.

And in a time when the world - and often the Church - feels increasingly fractured, this interconnectedness matters more than ever. It is always easier to grow apart: to stay in our silos, to guard our patch, to retreat into the comfort of our own 'tribes'. But the Gospel calls us to do the harder, holier thing: to come together. To listen. To serve. To stretch out our roots and our arms in shared love and purpose.

As Paul writes, "We, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we belong to one another" (Romans 12.5). We belong to one another. That's not just theological poetry - it's the pattern of Christian life. And it's our calling here, as a parish, a Team, and a wider Church: to be rooted deeply in God and in one another, so that we might bear fruit that is not just for ourselves, but for the life of the world.

Let's look forward to what we might grow into together - connected not only by history and structure, but by love. Let's continue to tend those roots. Let's keep showing up for one another. And may the life of Christ flow through us, reaching far beyond what any of us can see.

Church Services:

St John the Divine's Sunday service at 11.00am is both in-person and live-streamed via their <u>Facebook page</u>. St John's midweek service takes place on Tuesday evenings with half an hour of quiet contemplation focused on the Blessed Sacrament at 6.30pm, followed by the Said Eucharist at 7.00pm. The last Tuesday of the month our regular Said Eucharist at 7pm is a Eucharist for Healing and Wholeness, with the opportunity to receive the Ministry of Laying on of Hands with Prayer and Anointing for yourself or to receive it on someone else's behalf. All are welcome.

St Mary Magdalene's Sunday services are at 8.00am, 9.30am, 11.30am (third Sunday only) and 6.30pm. Our 9.30am service will be live-streamed via <u>St Mary Magdalene Facebook page</u>. You can watch the service live as it happens, or once it is uploaded. There is a Said Eucharist at 10.00am every Wednesday, followed by coffee.

St Matthias' 9.30am Sunday service is an in-person service. The midweek Eucharist at St Matthias is held on Thursdays at 10.00am and is followed by coffee and biscuits. Everyone is very welcome to join us.
