Dear Friends,

This week Anne and I will have taken two funerals each. Every funeral is different, each deeply personal, and each one reminds us that change and loss touch every life. Funerals are some of the most profound occasions in parish ministry. They bring together grief and gratitude, memory and mourning, pain and hope. Standing with families at such moments sharpens our awareness that the familiar can slip away and life can look very different in an instant. Loss, of course, comes in many forms. Sometimes it is the sharp grief of the death of a loved one. Sometimes it is the loss of health, or a change in work or circumstances. Sometimes it is quieter: the realisation that a familiar rhythm is gone, that the world around us has shifted, that time has carried us into a season we never expected. Every change carries within it a kind of loss, because it asks us to let go of what was once familiar.

Autumn mirrors this reality. The long days of summer give way to shortening evenings; the leaves fall; the world seems to be letting go. There is beauty in this season, but there is also melancholy. Autumn tells the truth that nothing stays the same. And for many of us, that is unsettling. We are creatures of habit. We like our routines, our favourite hymns, our preferred pew. Even small changes can throw us off balance. (It could be said that the most dangerous words in the Church are: "But we've always done it this way!") And yet, the Bible is clear that God works in and through change. Israel grumbled in the wilderness about the "leeks and onions of Egypt" (Numbers 11.5). The disciples were bewildered when Jesus told them he was going where they could not follow. Mary Magdalene, in the garden on Easter morning, did not at first recognise the risen Christ because she was still looking for what had been familiar. Again and again, God shows up in the very moments when his people feel most lost.

St Paul writes, "We know that all things work together for good for those who love God" (Romans 8.28). He does not say all things are good—death and grief are real—but he does insist that nothing is wasted in God's hands. Jesus said: "Unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit" (John 12.24). What looks like an ending can, in God's grace, become the seed of new beginnings. This is true not only in our personal lives, but also in the life of the Church. The Catholic priest, Fr James Mallon, in his work on parish renewal, reminds us that we cannot cling only to what is comfortable or familiar. Renewal often means letting go of cherished habits or structures so that God's Spirit can bring fresh growth. Renewal is never about discarding our treasures; it is about shifting from a mindset of maintenance to one of mission, from keeping things ticking over to daring to share the Gospel afresh. Like the autumn trees, sometimes we must release what we cannot hold on to, so that new shoots may come in due season.

Tomorrow the Church of England will announce a new Archbishop of Canterbury. After a season of waiting, this moment brings hope. We pray for a shepherd of courage, integrity, and compassion, someone who will help the Church lean more deeply into God's mission and face the challenges of our time with faith and creativity. Leadership, like parish life, has its seasons of change. But the appointment of a new Archbishop reminds us that God continues to raise up leaders for his people and to provide fresh vision for his Church. Yet our ultimate hope does not rest in leaders, however gifted. It rests in Jesus Christ, crucified and risen. That is why funerals are not only occasions of grief but also occasions of faith. We mourn what we have lost, but we also proclaim what we believe: that in Christ, even death itself has been overcome. As St Paul says, "Death has been swallowed up in victory" (I Corinthians I 5.54).

So as we journey through this autumn season, with its changes and challenges, let us face them honestly but also with trust. Let us care for one another in grief, encourage one another in faith, and open ourselves to the renewing work of God's Spirit. For the final word is not loss, but life; not endings, but resurrection.


Whether you've done Alpha before or are completely new to it, we'd love your help in making it a welcoming and fruitful time for all involved.

Church Services:

St John the Divine's Sunday service at 11.00am is both in-person and live-streamed via their Facebook page.
