Dear Friends,

'Little Chicks', the new weekly baby and toddler group at St Matthias, got off to a good start at the beginning of October. Each session includes time for play, and ends with a story, song and a short toddler-friendly prayer. The story we listened to on the first morning was a familiar one from my childhood – and probably you will know it too – the story of Chicken Licken, a little chick who got very worried when an acorn fell on his head. Being a very little chick, he took the acorn to be a sign that the sky was falling in, and he rushed off to tell the King, taking many of his farmyard feathered friends with him. Our little chicks loved the story and happily joined in with the clucking, quacking and gobble-gobble noises of Chicken Licken's friends. They weren't quite so delighted when the little group of friends came across Foxy Loxy with his cunning invitation to follow a shortcut, a trick which would lead them straight to his dinner table! In truth we didn't actually make it to the dinner table last Friday morning - the ending of the story was edited with a slightly more gentle conclusion!

But the story got me thinking, not just about acorns of which there are a super abundant harvest this year, but about our human capacity to over-react like Chicken Licken, mis-reading the signs and worrying ourselves to distraction, especially about the things we have little control over. And worry, as disciples of Jesus will know, is not to be encouraged: 'why do you worry so much?' says Jesus, take a look around you and see how beautiful the world is, and how clever mother nature is in providing for your needs (you can read his words of reassurance and encouragement in Matthew's gospel Chapter 6, verses 25-34; and also in Luke's gospel, chapter 12, verses 22-34). Trusting in God's provision for our lives, for all that we have and all that we are, should shield us from too much worry, but when we look at the world and inevitably despair at the cruel depths to which humanity can descend in our dealings with one another, let alone read about the damage done by climate change, it's easy to worry about where it will all end. But Jesus tells us to lift our eyes upwards and outwards, see the needs of others and do all you can to alleviate suffering, in other words keep our eyes fixed on him and on all that he teaches us about kingdom living and caring for the world and its people. And when we need extra reassurance and strength to keep on keeping on following in his footsteps, take a look at mother nature and all the beauty and bounty God showers on us. And as autumn leaves and acorns fall, especially in this Mast Year when all the trees of the field are producing an over-abundance of nuts, fruits, seeds and berries, we can give thanks that despite all the damage we have done to this planet in the past, the natural world knows what we need and keeps on providing for us.

Not worrying about life unnecessarily doesn't mean, of course, that we are off the hook as far as working to protect, heal and nurture this planet. There is much to do, but worrying won't change a thing. Actively playing our part, recycling and upcycling, reducing food waste and consuming less, planting more trees (which is what mother nature is doing in a Mast Year – over producing seed to ensure survival and abundant growth in the future), all of this goes towards a healthier environment and will help us worry less when we feel we can make a positive contribution.

If you are in need of a little more reassurance and encouragement so that you worry less, then why not do as Chicken Licken did and go and see the King (avoiding the foxy people along the way who love to lead you in the wrong direction!). King Charles has been a prophet for most of his adult life, and he has been an effective warrior in the fight against waste and agricultural practices which have caused untold damage to this planet and the people who are least able to cope with climate change. And his son, our future King William, is following in his father's footsteps. Watching an interview with him the other evening as he spoke about the incredible, inspiring and even miraculous work being done by the scientists and environmentalists around the world who have entered for this year's Earthshot prize, will help alleviate anyone's propensity to worry.

There is much to do, but the sky hasn't fallen in yet, and with God's help, when we tread gently on this sacred earth, and play our part working together to heal the damage we have done, we give mother nature a fighting chance to provide for our needs and the needs of all who will come after

us. So, let's all play our part, keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus, worrying less and trusting in God's provision more. "Do not be afraid little flock" says Jesus, "it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom" (Luke 12:32)


