Dear Friends,

This time last year Stephen Cottrell, the Archbishop of York, had a new book published, 'Praying by Heart, the Lord's Prayer for everyone'. It's a helpful guide for anyone who would like to plummet the depths of the prayer Jesus taught his disciples, a prayer many of us learnt by heart when we were children, and in this season of Remembrance, especially as we approach Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day and reflect on the urgent need for reconciliation, peace and unity in the world today, this prayer – which has less than 70 words – is relevant as well as challenging.

Archbishop's Stephen's books are an accessible mix of theology and spirituality and I've found this little book a helpful resource when it comes to prayer. It's especially helpful for anyone who wants to find a way to add depth and structure to their prayer life, and for anyone who struggles to find the words to even begin to pray because the needs of the world feel overwhelming at times, then the Lord's Prayer is a gift (as Jesus meant it to be!). Taking each petition at a time, mulling over the words, reflecting on them slowly and meditatively is key; quite often taking just one line at a time or even just a couple of words at a time - provides me with enough food for thought and there's no need to go any further. This gift of a prayer is, in so many ways, the only prayer we need. Take those first two opening words for instance: 'Our Father'. Our. Not my Father, or your Father, not my God or your God, but our Father, our God. There it is, at the very beginning of the prayer which Jesus taught us, words from the heart of God to our hearts - Our Father. When we are reflecting on our inability as a human race to live in peace, our failure to love our neighbour as ourselves, these two words bring us up short, a reminder that we are brothers and sisters together, whether we like each other or not we are part of the same family, all of us beloved children of the same heavenly Father. The prayer Jesus taught us is a declaration of the unity we already have - our calling as followers of Christ, as the Church, is to work to make this truth visible and felt. That word 'our' is key to understanding who we are and whose we are, and yet our common humanity under God seems an alien concept to the rich and powerful political voices in the world today, especially and shamefully to those who dare to proclaim to be followers of Jesus. We don't pray, "give me today my daily bread, or forgive me my sins", the prayer is forgive us: we have responsibility for one another. We, never me. Imagine a world where it was always we and never me...

The Lord's Prayer helps us to discover that what's best for us and our flourishing is to be found in community with others. We discover who we are through our relationship with others. Our well-being is tied up with the well-being of our neighbour. Our isolation from one another, and from God, causes us to stumble and fall. Adam and Eve, made for communion with each other and with God, turn on each other, blame each other, and try to hide from God. Cain slays his brother Abel, and on it goes... separation, isolation, failure.

In his exploration of the Lord's Prayer, Archbishop Stephen offers hope and wise words. He speaks of the prayer as a pattern for life, not just a pattern for prayer. Right praying he suggests, shapes right living. We learn this prayer by heart, but its only by living the prayer that our hearts are changed. We may have taken the Lord's Prayer for granted, especially those of us who learned it as children, and too often we say it parrot fashion and give it no thought. And yet in this prayer God is saving us from ourselves, God is teaching us how to live our lives in communion with God and with each other. By giving us this extra-ordinary prayer, and by its repetition so that it dwells deep within us, our God is teaching us how to live.

And over the next few poignant and sad days, as we remember how not to live, we need that prayer to dwell more deeply than ever within us, and learn the lessons Jesus longs to teach us.

St John the Divine's Sunday service at 11.00am is both in-person and live-streamed via their Facebook page.
