Dear Friends,

A few weeks ago, I was at the Victoria Inn on Hill Rise, where I was kindly taught how to pour a proper pint of Guinness. (There's an art to it!) The glass must be tilted at just the right angle, filled slowly, then left to rest so that the dark liquid settles before it's topped up with that creamy white head. It's part science, part ritual and rather satisfying. That moment came to mind as I began watching *The House of Guinness*, the fairly new Netflix series that explores the story of Ireland's most famous brewing dynasty. It's full of all the grandeur and contradiction of Irish history itself; faith and doubt, poverty and prosperity, conflict and community. What makes the series compelling is that it isn't simply about a business empire. It's about legacy, about how belief, family, and conscience shaped a brand that became part of the national story.

Arthur Guinness, who founded the brewery in 1759, was a man of faith as well as ambition. He was influenced by the evangelical revival sweeping through Britain and Ireland - by the preaching of John Wesley and the growing conviction that industry and morality belonged together. His Christianity was Protestant and reforming, yet it was also generous and public-spirited. In a Dublin still marked by sectarian tension, social inequality, and deep suspicion between Catholic and Protestant communities, the Guinness family's philanthropy stood out. They built housing for workers, supported hospitals and schools, funded sanitation and clean water, and sought to improve the lives of ordinary Dubliners - Catholic and Protestant alike.

It's worth remembering that this was no simple task. Religion in Ireland was rarely just about private devotion; it was entangled with questions of identity, power, and belonging. For a Protestant family of privilege to use their wealth for the common good was, in its own way, a form



of witness — an expression of a faith that refused to be confined by tribal loyalties. The Guinnesses were never saints, and their legacy is not unblemished. But their story suggests that faith can, at its best, bridge divides and transform public life. Watching the series, and remembering that carefully poured pint, I found myself thinking about what kind of "house" we are building in our own time. Every parish, like every family, inherits something from the past: a mix of faith and frailty, of beauty and brokenness. The question is what we do with that inheritance. St Paul writes, "Like a wise master builder I laid a

foundation, and another is building on it. Each builder must choose with care how to build" (I Corinthians 3.10).

Here in the Richmond Team Ministry - at St Mary Magdalene, St Matthias, and St John the Divine - we, too, are the stewards of a rich legacy. We have beautiful buildings, deep roots in our community, and traditions of worship and service that have shaped generations. Yet, like the Guinness family, we must also find ways to renew what we've been given, to ensure that what we build is not simply for ourselves, but for those who will come after us. The Church, after all, is not a museum but a living house, a place where faith is brewed and shared afresh each day. Like the care that goes into crafting a pint of Guinness, the life of the Church depends on attention and patience: the steady pouring of prayer, compassion, and hope into the fabric of our community. But the Irish story also reminds us that houses of faith can become divided, that religion can wound as well as heal. That's why the Psalmist's reminder still holds true: "Unless the Lord builds the house, those who build it labour in vain" (Psalm 127.1). We build best when we build for reconciliation — when our "house" becomes a place where strangers are welcomed, burdens are shared, and God's grace flows freely.

So perhaps the real lesson of *The House of Guinness* is that legacy is not about wealth or reputation, but about the courage to serve. A good pint takes time to settle; so does a faithful life. May we, in our Team churches, continue to build a house that overflows with generosity, beauty, and love - a house where all can taste and see that the Lord is good.
