Dear Friends,

As the Church year draws to its close and we celebrate Christ the King on Sunday, I've been reflecting on some words Jesus says to Peter at the end of John's Gospel, words spoken not in the excitement of the beginning of discipleship but in the tenderness of the risen Lord's final commissioning:

"When you were younger, you fastened your own belt and went wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go." (John 21.18)

These words have a surprising realism to them. They speak honestly about the way our lives change. They acknowledge that the freedom and independence we may enjoy at one time of life are not the same as those we experience later. They also gently recognise that there are seasons when our choices are wide and seasons when they are narrower, and God is present in both. Psychologists often describe human life as unfolding in two broad stages. In the first stage, we concentrate on building. We learn who we are, we make decisions, and we set out on paths filled with energy, hope, and ambition. We choose careers, we form families, we build friendships, and we discover passions. We are outward-facing, longing to make our mark, to stand on our own, to show that we can flourish. It's a good and necessary stage. It equips us. It helps us grow. It gives us a sense of direction.

But then there is a second stage that eventually arrives for all of us in one way or another. It's a stage when life doesn't always turn out as we planned. When health shifts. When we find ourselves looking after those who once looked after us. When retirement becomes part of the story and raises questions about identity and purpose. When children or grandchildren take paths we worry about but can no longer direct. When decisions about moving or downsizing come into view. When we become more aware of our limits, physical, emotional, practical, and learn to rely on others more than we once did. This second stage can come earlier or later in life, and sometimes it arrives unexpectedly. It isn't something to fear or resist. It is simply part of being human. Ronald Rolheiser writes that this transition is often the moment when our spiritual lives grow most deeply. The first half of life is about creating a life. The second is about offering that life in love, sometimes through action and sometimes through trust.

And so, I want to say something very plainly and sincerely, particularly to those in our community who recognise themselves in this description:

You are held.

You are loved.

You are precious.

You are valued.

Your worth is not tied to independence or productivity. The things you carry - worries about the future, uncertainty about health, the emotional labour of caring for someone else, or the challenge of adjusting to change - are not signs of weakness, but signs that your heart remains open and generous.

Your faith is not measured by how smoothly life is going but by the trust you show in the middle of change. You are showing the rest of us what following Jesus looks like when the road bends, when control slips from our hands, and when the next step is taken slowly and thoughtfully. Christ the King is not a celebration of domination or triumph in the worldly sense. It is about the kingship of the One who kneels to wash feet, who walks alongside the weary, who stretches out

his hands in vulnerability, who entrusts himself entirely to the Father. His power is always the power of love.

This means that Christ reigns right where you are - in every question, in every difficult decision, in every moment of courage as you face what is changing. He reigns in your prayers for others. He reigns in every act of compassion you offer. He reigns in the honesty with which you meet each day. His kingdom is present in the lives that may sometimes feel hidden, quiet, or ordinary - but are, in truth, profoundly faithful. As we end the Church year and move into Advent - a season of waiting, trusting, and looking for Christ's presence - may you know that Jesus walks with you in every stage of your life. There is no point in the journey where you step outside his care. Whether you feel like the one fastening your own belt or the one stretching out your hands for help, you remain always within his loving embrace.

NEW: Announcement for the Richmond Team Ministry Sunday 16 November 2025

We are delighted to announce that The Bishop of Southwark, in consultation with the parish representatives and the Dean of King's College Cambridge, has appointed the Revd Robert Stanier to be the Interim Team Rector of the Richmond Team Ministry, for a period of up to three years. Robert is currently Vicar of St. Andrew & St. Mark, Surbiton. Robert is delighted to be taking up this new appointment, and subject to the satisfactory completion of the necessary procedures, he will take up this post at the end of February 2026.

Robert grew up not far from Richmond, in East Sheen, and has been in ministry for nineteen years, spending all of that time in Southwark Diocese. He served his curacy at St George, Christ Church with St Paul in Forest Hill, and then became school chaplain at Archbishop Tenison's School, Lambeth while also working as a youth minister in the North Lambeth Team and in the parish of St Anne and All Saints. South Lambeth.

He has been the vicar of St Andrew's and St Mark's, Surbiton since 2013 and during that time served a five year term as Area Dean of Kingston.

Before getting ordained, he worked in market research and then strategic marketing consultancy for the Henley Centre.

He remains a regular player for the Southwark Clergy Cricket Team, and occasionally they even win a match. As well as playing, he writes on cricket and sport for 'The Nightwatchman' and 'The Church Times'.

He has also authored a website dedicated to the wines of the Cotes de Thongue, a zone in the south of France that remains a niche interest even among hard core wine enthusiasts. He is married with three children.
