#### Dear Friends,

Advent is, at its heart, a season shaped by a single, ancient prayer:

Maranatha - "Come, Lord." This short Aramaic plea from the earliest Christians holds together the promise and the longing of our faith. Before we place a wreath, light a candle, or sing a familiar carol, the Church whispers this word into the gathering darkness:

Come, Lord Jesus. Advent reminds us that everything begins with God's initiative.

God reaches towards humanity with love long before we reach back. God calls; we respond. God invites; we open our hands.

Our whole spiritual life is contained within that cry: Maranatha. Come, Lord.

The Scriptures reveal a God who is always inviting. Abraham is invited to leave his homeland for a future he cannot yet see. Isaiah is invited to speak comfort to a weary people. Mary is invited to bear God's Word made flesh. St Augustine reminds us that God is "nearer to us than we are to ourselves," meaning that God's invitation begins deep within us—even before we know how to name it. The God who invites Abraham, Isaiah, and Mary is the same God we call upon in Advent. When we pray *Maranatha*, we step into that long story of divine invitation. Jesus' ministry continues this holy pattern. He calls fishermen from their nets, tax collectors from their tables, the afflicted from their pain, and the weary from their burdens. His welcome is expansive, but it is not passive. Jesus does not simply offer comfort; he offers a calling. To be welcomed by Jesus is to be drawn into His way of life: a life of mercy, courage, prayer, justice, self-giving love, and joy. Advent, with its watchful stillness, invites us once again to receive not only Christ's comfort but His summons. When we pray *Maranatha*, we are not just asking Jesus to come, we are offering ourselves to follow.

This is where Advent speaks powerfully into our life as a parish. It invites us to consider the difference between being a *churchgoer* and being a *missionary disciple*. A churchgoer attends services, perhaps regularly, perhaps occasionally, and may appreciate the rhythm, the beauty, the tradition, or the community. This is often the beginning of faith. But it is possible to attend church without allowing Christ to shape the whole of our life.

A missionary disciple is something different. A missionary disciple is someone who receives Christ's invitation deeply and personally, and then lets that invitation spill outward into daily life. They carry their faith into their work, their friendships, their decisions, their hopes, and their habits. Their identity is rooted not in attending church, but in belonging to Christ and participating in God's mission in the world. They do not see themselves as consumers of religious services, but as members of Christ's Body, sent to be His presence in the everyday spaces of life.

A churchgoer may seek comfort; a missionary disciple seeks calling.

A churchgoer may keep faith private; a missionary disciple knows faith naturally overflows into hospitality, kindness, justice, and gentle invitation. A churchgoer watches; a missionary disciple responds.

Julian of Norwich described God's love as something that "wraps and enfolds us," yet she also understood that love sends us outward towards others. That is the heart of missionary discipleship: held by God, we become people who carry God's welcome into the world. When *Maranatha* becomes our prayer, it also becomes our posture; expectant, ready, willing. And missionary discipleship is always deeply invitational. If we follow a God who invites, then we are called to be an invitational parish. This is not primarily about programmes or publicity. It is about ordinary, grace-filled gestures: a warm hello at the door, an invitation to share coffee, making space for newcomers, ensuring our worship is easy to follow, shaping our notices so they welcome rather than confuse.

These simple acts of attentiveness carry extraordinary spiritual weight. They show, quietly but clearly, that Christ's welcome is real. Yet invitation must also move beyond the church walls. Many will first encounter the Christian faith not through clergy or choirs, but through the gentle courage of a friend who says, "Would you like to come with me?" Lesslie Newbigin reminds the Church that it exists not for itself but "for the life of the world." Missionary disciples carry the hope of Christ into ordinary places - into conversations, workplaces, kitchens, classrooms, cafés, and street corners. They live with an Advent heart: watchful for God's presence, open to God's prompting, ready to respond.

And so this Advent, we pray Maranatha with renewed intention. We ask Christ to come to us, and we offer ourselves to go where He sends. We ask Him to shine in our parish, and we choose to be bearers of

that light for others. We ask Him to renew His world, and we commit to the work of welcome, hospitality, justice, and peace.

Come, Lord Jesus.

Maranatha.

Make us your people of invitation, your community of missionary disciples, your light in this waiting world.

NEW: Memorial Service for Revd Julian Reindorp, 29 November 2025.

Dear friends

Hundreds of people poured into St Mary Magdalene on Saturday to the ringing of our bells, so we could gather together to remember and celebrate the life, service, and ministry of Revd Julian Reindorp, 22 June 1944 - 14 September 2025.

Julian spent 17 years of his long parish ministry as priest and first Team Rector in Richmond (many more years when we include his ongoing pastoral support for us after he retired).

Julian's family was at the very centre of what was a moving, emotional and, at times, both sad and humorous service. It was led brilliantly by Rachel Carnegie, who had been Julian's curate here. With some 500 people packed into the church and standing room only - and remarkably increasing numbers online - we all reflected on this remarkable priest who loved people, loved God, and knew each of our names.

We had speakers from Julian's childhood and his friends as well as his beloved sister and four children on behalf of the family. Bleddyn and Judy Wright spoke of the Richmond years and Rabbi Guy Hall sang Psalm 23. Several priests who ministered alongside Julian in the Richmond team from St John's and St Matthias attended and the final blessing was given by Bishop Guli Francis-Deqhani, now Bishop of Chelmsford. Julian had chosen the readings and hymns.

There are too many people to thank by name: it was a great team who worked with the family and Rachel - James our verger was simply outstanding – but the last word of thanks must be for the flower team as the family was amazed and thrilled by the South Africa themed arrangements. Julian Reindorp: a beloved and Love-filled pastor and parish priest. As one speaker said: 'Rest in Peace- but we think he will be too busy....'.

## **Diocesan News:**

## NEW: A Message from The Bishop of Southwark, The Rt Revd Christopher Chessun

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

As we begin the Church's year and the wonderful season of Advent, so full of promise and hope, I share with you that His Majesty The King has graciously consented to my request to retire on my seventieth birthday in August next year. I have had the privilege of serving this Diocese for over twenty years in two episcopal roles, and of sharing the cure of souls with the many excellent clergy who hold my licence. I am mindful of all that you have given generously and sacrificially, as clergy and lay people, to strengthen partnerships in the Gospel in the parishes and ministries to which you have been called. I thank God for you daily, and ask for your prayers in these concluding months.

I shall be nominating Bishop Rosemarie as Acting Bishop of Southwark, to work with the Diocesan College of Bishops. A year ago when I was convalescing, greatly encouraged by your prayers and good will, Bishop Rosemarie convened the College of Bishops with authority and grace in an uncertain time. I ask for prayers for her during the Vacancy in See, and also for my esteemed colleagues Bishop Martin and Bishop Alastair. I shall hand the Diocesan crozier to Bishop Rosemarie at my final service at Southwark Cathedral on Saturday 18 July 2026 at 12 noon and I am confident that she will lead a senior team that is well prepared for this change — it is a brilliant and effective team.

During my time in Southwark I have very much enjoyed leading diocesan and co-leading ecumenical pilgrimages, particularly to the Holy Land. In recent years I have a very strong sense of how important the reality and metaphor of journey and pilgrimage is in the Christian Faith. It is the Way, as we seek together to understand God's loving purposes for us, to speak well of each other, and to honour our Baptism and participation in Christ.

I have a heartfelt desire, God willing, to continue to serve Christ's Church, but my own personal sense of pilgrimage is captured in Walter Raleigh's poem, 'The Passionate Man's Pilgrimage':

Give me my scallop shell of quiet, My staff of faith to walk upon, My scrip of joy, immortal diet, My bottle of salvation, My gown of glory, hope's true gage, And thus I'll take my pilgrimage.

It has been a privilege to make my pilgrimage with you over these years. You have been hearty companions. I am confident that in God's providence there will be joy and sustenance for each and every Southwark pilgrim in the faithful years to come, the Lord himself being our helper.
