Dear Friends,

I am writing this on Ash Wednesday afternoon, at the beginning of our Lenten journey. This morning, along with Rev'd James Marsden from the Barnes Team Ministry, I had the privilege of offering 'Ashes to Go' outside Richmond Station. In the space of just forty-five minutes, more than thirty people stopped to receive the sign of the cross traced on their foreheads.

Some had clearly planned to come. Others paused on their way to work, drawn by curiosity. A few asked thoughtful questions: What does this mean? Why ashes? What is Lent about? There were commuters with coffee cups in hand, people navigating the ordinary busyness of the morning rush. And there, on the pavement, in the middle of everyday life, we marked foreheads with ash and spoke ancient words of truth: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." What struck me most was the gratitude. Again and again, people said thank you - not politely, but sincerely. They were thankful that the Church had met them where they were: on their way to work, in the middle of an ordinary weekday morning. There was something deeply moving about that. Lent did not wait inside church walls; it stepped onto the street.

Ash Wednesday confronts us with our mortality and our need of God. It is honest, bracing, real. Yet it is also profoundly hopeful. The ashes are not a sign of despair but of belonging. They remind us that we are fragile and finite, yes - but also loved. Held. Claimed. Lent, at its heart, is about renewal. It is about turning again to God. The biblical word for repentance simply means to turn around. To reorient. To change direction. All of us, in different ways, know what it is to drift. Life is busy. Attention is fragmented. Prayer becomes sporadic. Faith becomes background noise rather than living relationship. Without noticing, we can find ourselves slightly off course. Lent is God's gracious invitation: Come back. Begin again.

The ashes on the pavement outside Richmond Station were a reminder that this invitation is not reserved for the obviously devout. It is offered to commuters and passers-by, to the curious and the uncertain, to those whose faith feels strong and to those who are not sure what they believe. It is offered to us all. The Church traditionally encourages three practices in Lent: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving (charity). These are not about religious performance. They are about making space. Prayer creates space for God's voice amid the noise. Fasting loosens our attachment to the things that crowd our hearts. Generosity stretches us beyond ourselves and towards our neighbour. Perhaps this Lent you might set aside ten minutes a day for stillness. Perhaps you might read a Gospel slowly, attentively. Perhaps you might give something up - not as a test of willpower, but as a way of rediscovering what truly sustains you. Perhaps you might give more generously, in time or resources, as a sign that love is always outward-facing.

In the life of our Richmond Team Ministry, this Lent also unfolds at a moment of transition and hope. We look forward to the induction and installation of Robert Stanier as Interim Team Rector and Vicar of St Mary Magdalene. It feels fitting that his ministry among us begins in a season shaped by reflection and renewal. Lent reminds us that the Church, too, is always turning again. Always reforming. Always being drawn more deeply into the life of Christ. Times of change can feel uncertain, but they are also fertile ground for growth. I hope you will hold Robert, his family, St Mary Magdalene, and our whole Team Ministry in your prayers as he takes up this new role. May this season strengthen our shared life and deepen our common purpose.

This morning, as I traced the sign of the cross onto familiar and unfamiliar foreheads, I was reminded that faith is not something we manufacture. It is something we receive. Gift. The cross marked on each person was the same cross traced at baptism - the sign that we belong to Christ, in life and in death.

Over thirty people in forty-five minutes paused long enough to remember that they are dust - and that they are loved.

Lent offers each of us that same pause. If you have been distant from worship, come back. If prayer has faltered, begin again. If faith feels fragile, bring even that to God.

May this holy season be for you a time of gentle honesty and deep renewal. May you discover again that God meets you in the ordinary pathways of your life. And as we journey together towards Holy Week and the joy of Easter, may we find ourselves changed, renewed, and strengthened in faith, hope and love.

With every blessing for a holy and fruitful Lent.

World Day of Prayer. Friday 6 March 2026, 2.30pm, The Barn Church

Our sisters in Nigeria invite us to join them for the World Day of Prayer on Friday 6 March 2026. The service they have prepared reflects on the theme, "I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28-30). The World Day of Prayer is an international, women-led, ecumenical movement that shares the hopes concerns, and prayers of women from around the globe. Each year, women from a different country craft a service, sharing their unique spiritual journey and culture. For 2026, the women of Nigeria have created a service that speaks to our need for peace and solace, drawing on their faith and experiences in a world filled with struggle and anxiety.

With over 120 countries across the world taking part, this is a powerful demonstration of global solidarity. The day begins in Samoa and moves across the world in a continuous wave of prayer, finishing 38 hours later in American Samoa. It truly is a worldwide day of prayer!
